SMASH!

Clumsy visitor destroys priceless vases ву том Вал

A CLUMSY visitor to a British museum has destroyed a set of priceless 300-year-old Chinese vases after slipping on the stairs.

Past Simple and time expressions

3.3 Past Continuous

Form

was/were + verb + -ing

I was learning French. They were driving to Paris.

We weren't waiting for a long time.

What were they doing? Where was he studying?

Short answer

Were you looking for me? Yes, I was./No, I wasn't.

Were they waiting outside? Yes, they were./No, they weren't.

Use

The Past Continuous is used:

- 1 to express activities in progress before, and probably after, a particular time in the past.
 - At seven o'clock this morning I was having my breakfast. You made a lot of noise last night. What were you doing?
- 2 for descriptions.
 - Jan looked beautiful. She was wearing a green cotton dress. Her eyes were shining in the light of the candles that were burning nearby.
- 3 to express an interrupted past activity.
 - When the phone rang, I was having a shower. While we were playing tennis, it started to rain.
- 4 to express an incomplete activity.
 - *I was reading a book during the flight.* (I didn't finish it.) *I watched a film during the flight.* (the whole film)



3.4 Past Simple or Past Continuous?

- Sometimes both tenses are possible. The Past Simple focuses on past actions as complete facts. The Past Continuous focuses on the duration of past activities. Compare:
 - A I didn't see you at the party last night.
 - B No. I stayed at home and watched the football.
 - **A** I didn't see you at the party last night.
 - B No, I was watching the football at home.
- 2 Questions in the Past Simple and Past Continuous refer to different time periods. The Past Continuous asks about activities before; the Past Simple asks about what happened after.
 - A What were you doing when the accident happened?
 - B I was shopping.
 - A What did you do when you saw the accident?
 - **B** I **phoned** the police.



3.5 used to

Used to expresses a habit or state in the past that is now finished. I used to read comics when I was a kid. (but I don't now) My dad and I used to play football together. (but we don't now) Did you use to read comics when you were a child? This town didn't use to be a nice place to live, but then it changed.



3.6 Past Perfect

Perfect means 'completed before'. The Past Perfect refers to an action in the past that was completed before another action in the past.

Form

The form of the Past Perfect is the same for all persons.

Positive and negative

YOU	d (had) nadn't	seen him before. finished work at six oʻclock.

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3.7 Past tenses in the passive

Form

Past Simple Passive: was/were + past participle The museum was opened in 1987. We were burgled last night.

Past Continuous Passive: was/were being + past participle The vase was being restored.

Past Perfect Passive: had been + past participle The house had been redecorated

Use

The uses are the same in the passive as in the active. The bridge was built in 1876. (finished action in the past) The bomb was being defused when it exploded. (interrupted past activity)

The letter didn't arrive because it had been sent to my old address. (one action before another action in the past)
