Using context

We can use context, or the words around a multiple meaning word, to figure out its meaning.

1. Excuse me?

it might sound offensive with wrong intonation!

2. Sorry? # focus on the intonation

3. Pardon? ... I beg your pardon?

posh and formal with an upward intonation otherwise you might sound a bit harsh!

4. What was that, sorry?

focus on the intonation

5. What did you just say?

focus on the intonation

6. Sorry, could you say that again please?

courteous, use please at the end

7. Sorry, I didn't quite catch that? # respectful

8. Would you mind repeating that again? # polite

9. Come again! # informal

10. How's that again?

very informal
